Settled Minister Search Committee Communiqué

Your Settled Minister Search Committee meets weekly. The committee Chairperson is Lisa Demian and the members are Marcia Mahood, Diane Slon, Ben Ensroth, Andrew Schreck, Amy Smalley, and Eric Sargent.

Thanks to the many members and friends who completed the Congregational Survey and participated in Focus Groups. With completion of the survey and focus group process, the Search Committee is working diligently to use the data to create the Congregational Record. This, in turn, becomes part of the packet that prospective ministers use to see if their interests, skills, and personalities will mesh with BUC.

Beyond Categorical Thinking: the Workshop

Will the new minister hear me? Will my concerns and needs be met? Will the minister understand what I'm living with? How will the community respond to our minister?

In answering these questions, a picture of the "ideal minister" (categorized by age, gender, gender identity, nationality, physical ability, race, and sexual orientation) comes to mind. With this picture in place, it can be easy to unintentionally exclude ministers who fall into other categories.



BUC will participate in the Beyond Categorical Thinking workshop offered by the UUA for congregations involved in the search for a new minister. The Settled Minister Search Committee invites all congregational leaders, members and friends to participate in the workshop. Our two workshop leaders, Jerry Carden and Kathleen Robbins join us from their church in Champaign/Urbana, IL and themselves represent some of the diversity we seek. They will share their own powerful stories and help examine ways to be totally inclusive in our consideration of ministerial candidates.

The Beyond Categorical Thinking program is designed to promote inclusive thinking and help prevent unfair discrimination in the search process for a new minister. This program includes a three-hour BCT workshop and a Sunday morning service with our 2 UUA trained facilitators. In the afternoon workshop, participants will:

- Consider the hopes, expectations and concerns they have for a new minister
- Learn more about the ministerial search process, and
- Explore how thinking categorically about people sometimes interferes with choosing the best candidate

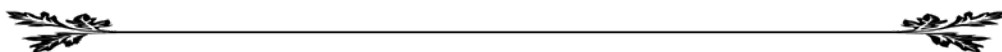

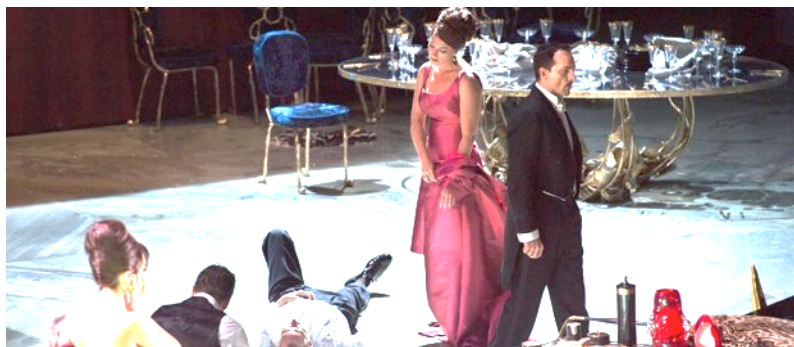


Opera Buffs: *The Exterminating Angel*

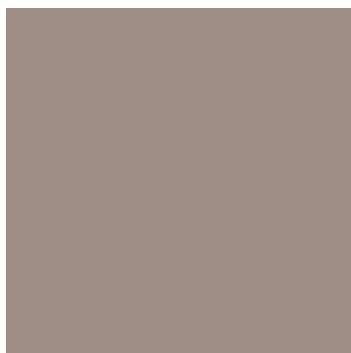


+ MAMA's Coffeehouse: Diamonds in the Rust

Board of Trustees Report to the Congregation

In our new church year, we are pleased with the worship initiatives of our co-ministers, Reverends Patricia and Daniel. Having two ordained ministers divide duties and responsibilities is a new experience for us, but the work they are doing is of a very high quality. Sunday words and music are successfully intertwined and we are hearing many statements of pleasure and satisfaction from congregants.

At our October meeting, we did a number of things. 1) Our treasurer, Claudia Kocher, announced that pledge and total income YTD were on budget. She also announced that a letter went out to all who made a five-year pledge to the capital campaign, asking individuals and couples to consider completing their campaign pledges early in light of the record-breaking stock market. We have had a number of positive responses to this request. 2) Kym Worth, Associate Executive, told us of some campus renovations that need adjustment and that steps are being taken to resolve outstanding problems.

When we were first discussing the executive function being put in the hands of our co-ministers, I suggested we wait till the October meeting to decide how the issue would be resolved. Since everything was going well, we resolved this in the September board meeting. The board named our ministers "Co-Executives." We also considered the work done by Kym Worth and designated her as "Associate Executive," giving the congregation three outstanding people full administrative responsibilities.

We are engaging the stewardship committee in early discussions about the spring annual pledge drive. We need to address some previously overlooked needs in staff compensation. This year, for example, we gave part-time staff pro-rated financial support for health care and we need to continue such a budget item for the future. In addition, we should, if at all possible as a result of the response to the pledge drive that will come up in late winter, be sure that staff members are being paid according to UUA recommendations.

Finally, we reviewed several principles surrounding policy governance as well as a document from the Pastoral Care Committee on a "Safety plan for Missing and Endangered Persons." (For information on these topics, please see me.)

Aspects of both of these traditions will be discussed, including the value of traditional liturgy vs. spontaneity. Many people find comfort in the familiarity of traditional prayers. Liturgical prayers also remind followers of their professed beliefs. However, others feel spontaneous openness often more fully captures the feelings of the moment and the inner seeking of the believer.

OWL (Our Whole Lives), which meets each week from 9:30 a.m. ~ 12:30 p.m. in the BUC Commons, will be looking at social media, bullying, and sexual behavior, including the danger of sexually transmitted infections. OWL teachers are Dave Graham, Kateri McMullen, Max Kort, and Kye Campbell-Fox.

High school youth are continuing to look at the concept of "disability" in a social justice context, specially designed for our program by BUCer and brain trauma physician Dr. Paola Seidel.
